# Ordinary Time

October 30, 2016 ♦ Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time (C)  
 Wis 11:22—12:2 ♦ 2 Thes 1:11—2:2 ♦ Lk 19:1-10

I'm the shortest one in nearly every picture in which I appear. It's not that I'm that short (about three inches below average), but I am surrounded by taller people. Consequently, Zacchaeus has always been a particular favorite of mine. I certainly would have tried to get higher to see Jesus, too. Maybe Zacchaeus and I would have shared a branch. But Zacchaeus inspires me for another reason. When Jesus, whom Zacchaeus knew only by reputation, called to him, his response was immediate. He came down to stand in front of Jesus. In their society, tax collectors were considered traitors and ostracized by all. In the process of working for the Romans, Zacchaeus strengthened Caesar's influence and likely charged more than he should have to support a wealthy lifestyle when most Jews lived in poverty.

Seeing Zacchaeus in the tree, Jesus seized the opportunity to bring conversion to a sinner. Instead of judgment or bitterness from a stranger, Jesus offered him words of welcome. Zacchaeus heard the invitation (literal and spiritual) in Jesus' statement—"I must stay at your house"—and "received him with joy."

When Jesus enters our house, we find the strength to turn from sin. The effect of Jesus' presence on Zacchaeus was immediate. As they stood together, he turned from his sin and promised to care for the poor and make restitution for anything he stole. Let us hurry to receive Jesus into our hearts and turn away from our sin as well.

## Staying until Mass is over



Do I need to stay until the very end of Mass? The short concluding rites feel anticlimactic after Communion.

**The Mass** is intended to contain "a conscious, active, and full participation of the faithful, ...fervent with faith, hope and charity" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 18). At Mass, the faithful form one body, a holy people, to "give thanks to God and offer the unblemished sacrificial Victim not only by means of the hands of the Priest but also together" (*GIRM* 95). This is achieved through "their deep religious sense and their charity toward brothers and sisters who participate with them" (*GIRM* 95). Thus, reverence for God at Mass includes a proper respect for the people worshipping with you. Remaining until the recessional concludes—as well as arriving on time—is a sign of this reverence. It respects not only God and

your neighbors in the pew but also the ministers (ordained or lay), ushers, and everyone present.

After the faithful partake in the Eucharist, there is a communal period of silence to allow for personal prayer. Also, a psalm, canticle of praise, or hymn may be offered and sung (*GIRM* 88, 164). "There is no prayer more agreeable to God, or more profitable to the soul, than that which is made during the thanksgiving after Communion," wrote St. Alphonsus in *The Holy Eucharist*. While an early departure or late arrival at Mass may be, at times, unavoidable, it is preferable to celebrate Mass in its entirety, in heart, mind, soul... and body!
